




Update: Duke of Edinburgh Awards

Not even the snow and freezing temperatures could stop Mayville's hardy Duke of Edinburgh team from taking part in their training walk around Stansted Country Park. Taking part in the DoE Award in conditions such as these helps young people learn qualities such as resilience and helping them to face adversity with a sense of humour.

Since starting the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme at Mayville High School three years ago, 30 pupils have successfully completed their Bronze Award and 3 have completed their Silver. 25 pupils have signed up for Bronze this year with 11 opting to do Silver.

The summer proved to be one of extremes and saw pupils taking part in Bronze and Silver expeditions in the Purbecks which involved camping out, trekking, map reading and cooking food on Trangia stoves. The Bronze students walked for 2 days and camped out for 1 night and the Silver participants trekked for 3 days camping for 2 nights.

One of the highlights of the year for the D of E participants was meeting The Earl of Wessex on his visit to Portsmouth to meet schools involved in the Scheme. Mayville students proudly showed Prince Edward how despite cooking outside on small cookers, they were still able to produce healthy wholesome food.

Mayville's D of E expeditions and training exercises could not however be achieved without the help of a dedicated team of staff and also parents, who tirelessly give of themselves. If you feel you would like to come along and offer your support, Mrs Rickards would be very happy to hear from you.

Spring Term 2018

Whatever the weather, our year-round programme of trips and extra-curricular activities is designed to enhance school life. The 'Beast from the East' brought its own challenges but in true Mayville spirit, we ploughed on, making the most of our extended learning opportunities.

It was a term very much bookended by snow! The annual ski trip set off for Mayrhofen in Austria just after the Christmas holidays. A new destination for us, our pupils enjoyed two sessions on the slopes each day, along with the best of après-ski entertainment in the evenings. The Duke of Edinburgh orienteering expedition to Stansted House found its way through incredibly challenging conditions, whilst the school itself succumbed to the worst of the weather, with pupils enjoying rare 'snow days' on the South Coast.

Elsewhere, in warmer and drier conditions, our pupils took part in a wide range of extra-curricular activities and workshops. Book Week saw no less than three separate author visits this year. Junior pupils were wowed by Jeff Norton, Guy Bass and writer/illustrator team Sue Hendra & Paul Linnet. Our Senior children cast an eye to the future with Enterprise Week, Entrepreneur Speed-Networking, Tenner Tycoon and Mayville Dragon's Den – a series of events devised to give them valuable insight into business, marketing and a wealth of potential career opportunities.

Rock Challenge at the Guildhall was, as ever, a highly enjoyable event. Over a hundred of our pupils took part, both on stage and behind the scenes. The performance, called 'Behind Closed Doors', tackled controversial issues such as human trafficking and radicalisation. It was an amazing effort by everyone involved, with Mayville winning a total of eight awards.

Whether indoors or outdoors, taking centre stage or working tirelessly behind the scenes, Mayville children enjoy a wealth of opportunities to develop a balanced 'whole child' approach to learning.





Camps International Ecuador Expedition



In Summer 2018, eighteen students and two staff travelled the length and breadth of Ecuador, experiencing the depths of the Amazonian Rainforest to the East, the wild Pacific Coast to the West and the clarity and beauty of the Andes to the North.

Kate Jones, Head of Science and trip co-ordinator writes: "During our time in the jungle we started a garden for the local community to grow traditional herbs used in medicine and we laid foundations for a new community centre. We were also involved in building water containers to provide individual houses with a supply of fresh water. These are life changing to the families who can now wash, cook and bathe without multiple daily trips to the river.

Our next stop was the Pacific Coast for the PADI Open Water scuba diving course. Project work here included working in a tree nursery and helping to roof a local school. We also carried out a beach clean-up and saw first-hand the massive problem of plastic in the ocean. Our stay on the coast ended with an incredible whale watching trip.

In the Andes, life at altitude was challenging physically, as was the project work. Building a road by hand was tough, but the beautiful surroundings and the warmth and gratitude of the local people buoyed us up.

During our trip, we were blessed by a Shaman, trekked through jungle, learnt Kichwa, roasted coffee, plastered walls, slept in hammocks, dived with turtles while listening to whale song and stargazed.... and what did we learn? That our world is fabulous and diverse and deserves the utmost respect. That however far you travel, people are more similar than they are different. That we are all more capable and stronger than we think and finally, that kindness, tolerance and laughter can get you through pretty much anything.

What a privilege it was to share this adventure with such amazing, super-talented, wonderful young people."

Summer Term 2018

In complete contrast to the Spring term, Summer brought glorious weather and record sunshine. Our pupils took full advantage of the Great British Summer to venture out of the classroom and broaden their horizons.

Being central to Southsea, we are well placed to enjoy local facilities, whether taking art club for a drawing class on the beach or a class of Pre-Prep pupils to watch a visiting international tennis tournament. A short ride in one of the school minibuses sees children participating in local sports festivals. Slightly further afield, some of our younger children enjoyed day trips to Marwell and Fishbourne.

Residentials provide a unique opportunity for children to spend a few days out of the classroom, explore new environments, make new friendships and work as a team. Junior pupils took the now customary trips to Calshot, Kingswood as well as the Bushcraft weekend in Oxfordshire. Senior pupils enjoyed trips to France and the Hay Festival.

The fine weather allowed for a competitive end to the school's sporting calendar. Our 23 acre site at Eastney hosted the annual Pre-Prep sports day. The Junior swimming gala was hosted at Eastney pool, whilst the Junior and Senior sports day was held at the purpose-built track and field facilities at HMS Temeraire.

In July, we returned again to the Kings Theatre in Southsea with four performances of Disney's 'High School Musical' over two days. Two casts, with a combined crew of over 200 students, showcased the very best of Mayville – not just incredible creative talent, but children of all ages, working together as part of an inclusive team.

Our pupils have the benefit of first-class facilities and are supported by outstanding pastoral care, enabling them to explore a broad range of opportunities and discover their own unique interests and talents.



Charlotte West House

This new building has been part of a programme of change for Mayville which has seen the construction of our New Senior Department, Michael Babcock House, with its new hall, classrooms, a DT workshop, a student common room and an IT suite.

Charlotte West House completes this programme and is a fitting tribute to Mayville's founder whose visionary approach that the 'whole child' is at the heart of education resulted in the inception of our very unique school.









Performing Arts

Creativity is at the heart of Mayville life... dance, drama and music form an integral part of our curriculum and all pupils have a wide range of opportunities to perform throughout the year.

In addition to our yearly calendar of events, staging a major production at the Kings Theatre brings the whole school together, on stage and behind the scenes. Performing in front of family, friends and the public provides invaluable experience to our pupils, working as part of a team and building individual confidence.

High School Musical

In July, 200 Mayville children took to the stage at the Kings Theatre in Southsea to put on their very own performance of Disney's 'High School Musical'.

The story line is that basketball captain Troy and gifted scientist Gabriella try to break out of their cliques, by auditioning for the lead roles in their High School production. Worlds collide, as the teens struggle to balance their school commitments with the expectations of friends.

Mayville's Head of Creative Arts, Candice Doughty wrote;

This production was a very apt choice for our pupils as we are a very inclusive school with many of our children involved in lots of activities. In High School Musical Troy and Gabriella have to decide whether they go to the basketball game and the science decathlon rather than their auditions. This production had a certain relevance to the lives of our children and they were very excited about it.

Some of our cast members have performed professionally, in West End performances, in the English Youth Ballet and taken part in competitions and festivals achieving exceptional results. However for others in the lead parts, it was their first major opportunity and their first experience of performing in a professional theatre.

A large-scale production such as this is the perfect opportunity for Mayville to showcase its incredible talents, highly-professional production standards and, above all, unwavering teamwork.











Our year in sport

Supported by dedicated, highly-qualified staff and enjoying first-rate playing fields at nearby Cockleshell, our pupils enjoy the opportunity to participate and compete in a broad range of sporting activities.

NETBALL

LIV finished 4th in the ISA Under 13 netball tournament at Sherfield School.

Our Ug girls represented the school at their very first competitive netball competition at St John's College.

FOOTBALL

Our U15 football team won the Ditcham Park 6-a-side tournament, playing 7 games in all: they won 6 and drew 1, scoring 11 goals whilst not conceding a single one.

Harrison Etherington was selected to represent an England U12 side at the world's largest international youth tournament in Gothia, Sweden. Merson Vine has been scouted by Brighton & Hove Albion FC.

RUGBY

Harry Jones was selected to play for London Irish in 2017. Henry O'Hara achieved the 'Most Improved Player' award for Portsmouth United Services Rugby Club.

CRICKET

Henry was also selected for the Hampshire County Cricket Ug squad, he also represents Portsmouth at U11! Brothers Harrison & Elliot Etherington and James Boorah were all successful in their South East Hampshire cricket trials.

ROUNDERS

In a tense competition at Ditcham Park the U13 team lost the chance to play in the final by one point after coming second in their group. Points had to be counted back after an initial draw. They placed 4th out of 8.

TENNIS

National Real Tennis Championships: Max Jones won the U16 Singles and James Medlow won the U15 Doubles.

LII visited Southsea tennis courts to watch and participate in the international tennis tournament. The children saw pro Katie Boulter play in her final set and win the match!

BADMINTON

Key Stage 3 & Key Stage 4 boys badminton teams both made it to the Hampshire finals.

ATHLETICS

Our annual sports day at HMS Temeraire saw Freddie Powles and Myriam Yab awarded best Junior athletes, whilst Oliver Terry and Amy McLeod won the Senior titles. House winners were Cavell.

Benjamin Wright was placed 7th overall athlete in Portsmouth Quad Kids and achieved a Silver level UKA Award.

SWIMMING

Mayville took 15 Junior pupils to the Portsmouth and Havant Schools Swimming Gala. Our Girls won the Year 5/6 competition, with Mayville finishing 6th out of 16 overall.

Lily Gidney was placed 18th in the National Synchronised Swimming Competition and has been selected for the regional Beacon Squad, having the opportunity to work with England development coaches.

TAEKWONDO

Mayville after-school self-defence club members Alan Wong and Jasmine Lennox both achieved Black Tag Belt grading. Jasmine also won Bronze in the VW WTF Taekwondo Academy Southern Championships and Silver in the Chung Do Kwan Taekwondo competition.

ISA NATIONAL FINALS

Matthew Wicks became the first boy ever to qualify for three national ISA finals – athletics, cross country and swimming. In the swimming, national final of the 200m individual medley he came in 5th and then went on to take Gold in the Freestyle relay team with London West and then Silver in the individual medley relay. In athletics after coming first in the 800m at regionals he went on to come 4th at Nationals.

Naomi Robinson qualified for the ISA swimming finals. She won Bronze in $4 \times 50m$ freestyle relay, came 5th in 50m breastroke and 4th in 4×50 individual medley relay.

SPORTS ACADEMY

The launch of our Sports Academy was an amazing success and completely sold out. In a week of sporting activities, the highlight was a trip to Twickenham where the Sports Academy was treated to a private tour of the stadium, including the 'Royal Box', the England changing room, the hospitality suite and even got to walk out through the tunnel onto pitch side.

SPORTING ALUMNI

Past pupil and sailing champion Eilidh McIntyre took the bronze medal in the World Championships in Denmark. Alongside crew mate Hannah Mills, top flight sailor Eilidh also took silver in the women's 470 dinghy in the World Cup Series in Hyeres, France and Gold from the World Cup Series in Marseille. They now have their hopes set on the next Olympics in Tokyo.









Strong GCSE results despite challenging new exams.

Our GCSE results were 17 % above the national average. Headteacher Rebecca Parkyn said, "We are again delighted that our pupils have gained such super results, particularly given the additional challenge of the new GCSE with the changes in both content and approach."

This year Mayville has seen many success stories with excellent results. Rosie who achieved 9s in Science and a 9 in French said, "I'm shaking but I'm delighted." Molly Mae who achieved 9s in Science and a 9 in Geography said, "The GCSEs were hard, I did a lot of work and I'm really happy."

Emma (pictured left) was part of a group that took the Maths GCSE early gaining an A* in the iGCSE with most of that group also gaining the Additional Maths Qualification at A*. Emma gained top grades in Science as well as Statistics.
