

Type of Questions: There are three texts to read and a range of question types.

Some are shorter and based on comprehension or retrieval; others are longer and require you to either write a summary in your own words, an analysis of the language choices of a writer or to re-cast the material of a text into a different form,

e.g. from an article to a letter or an interview.

Question type:	What do I need to do?
1	
a-e	These are short answer questions on Text A which test comprehension and retrieval skills. You will find the answers in the text and you need to quote when asked and put in your own words when asked.
f	This is a longer answer question worth 10 marks based on Text B which requires you to write a summary.
2	
a-c	These are short answer questions about Text C which focus on word choices and meanings created.
d	This is a longer question about Text C which is worth 15 marks. Consider the purpose of the writing in the paragraphs selected and how the language choices link to this. Choose short, relevant quotations used frequently. Explain how the language of the selected extract creates meanings/effects. Look for language techniques and use the correct terminology (eg: similes/metaphors, powerful verbs/connotations of adjectives/ tone). Try to find effective examples of language or structural features and use subject specific terminology where you can to help you focus on the writer's methods.
3	This is an extended written response where there are 25 marks available, 15 for reading and 10 for writing. You are asked to use the content from Text C to produce a piece of creative writing in a particular form. For example, you might be asked to use the information you learn from reading an article to re-write in the form of an interview or a letter.



- 1. Before you start revising, get all your notes sorted, and draw up a list of all the topics you need to cover. We have done this bit for you! This serves two purposes: you will definitely cover everything you need to cover, and a bit of tidying and sorting out is a nice relaxing way to ease yourself into the revision process.
- **2. Don't just read through the textbook!** The only way to revise maths is to do maths. You will do much better spending 20 minutes doing maths questions than spending two hours just reading a textbook. The more questions you do yourself, the more you will get right, the higher your confidence will be, the more you will enjoy your revision, and the better you will do in the exam.
- 3. Use the internet. The internet is like having your own personal teacher who is available for you whenever
- you like. We have Mymaths, but there are other websites that can set you questions and mark them for you, take you through step-by-step how to tackle certain topics, and use fancy illustrations and animations that might just make that really annoying topic finally make sense. There are maths games which you can play to practise crucial skills in a more fun way. All this stuff is out there for you, so use it! Some of the best are www.emaths.org.uk, www.nrich.maths.org, www.corbettmaths.com and www.mrbartonmaths.com



4. Don't just practice the topics you can do. If you are really good at fractions, for example, it is very tempting to keep doing lots of fractions questions and then smiling as you keep getting them right. But unfortunately the exam is probably not going to have more than one or two fractions questions. Although it can be painful, work


your way through the topics that you struggle with, because it is much better to struggle on them at home, when you have time on your side and the answers available, than it is to struggle in the exam.

5. Make sure you ask for help. Again, once you are in the exam you are

on your own, but during revision you are certainly not. If you are stuck on a topic or a question, then ask one of the people from your class, or your teacher, or someone at home, or look on the internet, or use something like the Ask Nrich Forum, where you can ask maths questions and get really good answers very quickly. Don't suffer alone!

6. Practice doing questions under exam conditions. Get someone to pick you a set of questions from your textbook, or get some from a maths website, and try doing

them in silence, with no help, for a fixed amount of time. This will get you used to what it will be like in the exam, how fast you need to go, and is the best way of checking that you really understand a topic.

7. Practice using your calculator! Many people seem to assume that any question that lets you use a calculator is easy, and all calculators work the same. Those people are wrong on both counts. All calculators work differently, and unless you have used yours for lots of different types of questions (trig, Pythagoras, negative numbers, indices), you might come unstuck in the exam. Find out if there are any problems early enough to correct them!

The science of revision: nine ways pupils can revise for exams more effectively

Before you do any revision

1. Eat breakfast

It is estimated that around 27% of boys and 39% of girls skip breakfast some or all of the time. It's not called the most important meal of the day for nothing: research and their ability to recall information. Simply having a bowl of cereal will give students the concentration and memory boost they need.

2. Put your phone away

This should be an obvious one, but for many it isn't. Phones can be distracting; they are <u>linked to fomo</u> (fear of missing out), and evidence shows that <u>undergraduate</u> students who spend more time texting and using social media get lower grades. In another fascinating study, <u>researchers found that the mere sight of a phone was enough to reduce a person's ability to focus</u>. The implication couldn't be clearer: out of sight really is out of mind.

During revision sessions

3. Start early and spread it out

Actors don't leave their rehearsals until the day before opening night. Athletes don't only train the day before a match. To commit something to memory takes time. Spreading out your revision sessions on a particular topic (eg one-hour sessions over 10 days) is more effective than spending the same amount of time in one go (ie 10 hours in one day). This effect, known as "spacing", helps because it allows time in between revision sessions to forget and relearn the material. This strategy has been labelled as "one of the most robust across the entire history of experimental research on learning and memory"

4. Test yourself

Leading researchers in the field of memory consider <u>testing yourself as one of the most</u> <u>effective ways to improve your ability to recall information</u> (pdf). Testing yourself also helps you check for any gaps in your knowledge. Practice papers provide a good starting point, as well as quizzing yourself at the end of your revision session.

5. Teach someone

After you have tested yourself, teach the material to someone else. This has been

found to help aid memory and recall: it is known as <u>"the Protégé Effect"</u>. Teaching someone else requires you to learn and organise your knowledge in a clear and structured manner.

6. Think twice about using highlighters

Despite being the favourite weapon of many students tackling revision, <u>research</u> <u>suggests they don't work very well</u>. People learn and recall information better if they connect it to other pieces of information. Highlighters don't do this, they isolate single pieces of information. Quite often, students end up highlighting whole chunks and passages of text, which can give the appearance of having worked hard, but is of little value.

7. Don't listen to music

Parents around the world rejoice: you now have a legitimate reason to insist that your child stops listening to Justin Bieber on repeat. Students who study in a quiet environment can recall more than those who revise while listening to music. Extroverts, and those with an exceptional ability to control their attention, are not negatively affected as much: but it doesn't help. At best, for these students, it just doesn't hinder them as much as everyone else.

8. Get some fresh air and exercise

You cannot work all day, every day. Nor should you. Revision has to be about quality, as well as quantity. Going outside and getting some fresh air helps people feel. Furthermore, doing a little bit of exercise helps people deal better with stressful situations: it reduces anxiety and increases self-esteem.

9. Sleep

Students are encouraged to work hard and revise a lot before their exams: however, there comes a time when they need to stop and go to sleep. Knowing when can be tricky. There is a link between being a <u>perfectionist and struggling to sleep</u>. If a child is falling asleep within five minutes of their head hitting the pillow, they should probably be going to bed earlier. Other sleep tips include <u>having regular bedtimes</u>, <u>not being on your mobile phone in bed</u>, but if you are, <u>turning down the backlight on it.</u>

As research into psychology continues to develop, we learn more and more about how best to help pupils learn. Revision time can be challenging as it often requires pupils to monitor their own behaviour when working independently at home. Hopefully, by teaching them about what helps improve their memory, mood and concentration, we can better equip them to meet the challenges head on.

Check the daily notices for the exam timetable everyday to be aware of the venue for exams and study

- 1. Exams held in the DYC, you need to line up outside 10 minutes before the exam in alphabetical order
- 2. If exam is tiered, foundation tier first, followed by higher tier
- 3. Anyone using a laptop should go to a desk with a laptop and card with name on if they are not in the computer room
- 4. The seats should be filled in a snake formation, front to back on the first row, and then from the back to front on the second row etc
- 5. There should be absolute silence as soon as you enter the examination room. You must not communicate or look around the room at any time, except if you want to talk to a member of staff

No mobile phones or watches. Calculators to be reset, clear plastic pencil case and clear water bottles only.

- 6. You must be fully equipped and <u>take with you to every exam some revision material</u> <u>for a future exam</u> as you will often remain in the hall in silence after the exam has finished
- 7. You must ensure you have the correct paper or tier and ask any questions if you are unsure
- 8. Everyone must use the set time for the exam paper and any extra time if allocated
- 9. Extra time should be completed in a different colour pen and information about what was completed during extra time written on the front of the paper
- 10. All pupils who have extra time will have a card on their desk indicating the subject and their extra time
- 11. When the exam paper has been collected and ticked off in the register, quiet revision can be started until the end of the session

Pupils using a laptop must save their work to the memory stick in their named folder or print it.

- 12. Exams held in classrooms/computer rooms will follow the same procedure except you need to come to the allocated room and the teacher will tell you where to sit
- 13. During study lessons in classrooms, quiet individual revision will be completed for half the lesson. For the second half of the lesson, paired revision can be completed at the discretion of the member of staff covering the session
- 14. Use your revision guides to plan your revision during study time and when exams have finished during a session
