We are proud to announce the opening of our new Specialist Learning Support & Wellbeing Centre, Wyvern House, in September.
This exciting development will build on our successful CReSTeD registered, dyslexia unit, as the next step in our journey to becoming the lead provider for neurodiverse children (pages 4-5).

The Summer Term always provides opportunities for learning outside of the classroom. Junior pupils had residentials at Fort Purbrook and Corfe Castle (pages 10-13), whilst senior pupils took a trip to Valencia.

In May, we welcomed students from Paradis International College, as part of a cultural exchange. They spent a week with Year 9 pupils, enjoying timetabled and extra-curricular activities, whilst enjoying the local sites and attractions (pages 6-7).

Our annual Summer Fair took place in June, with a marquee providing respite from the blazing sun. The hugely well-supported event raised over £1350 for the Mayville PTA (pages 14-15).

In addition to our annual sports days (pages 20-25), sport at Mayville has shone throughout summer. We won medals and claimed PBs at the ISA Athletics, raced our eco car at Goodwood, launched our new sailing club and recorded great success across our cricket teams (pages 30-31).

A message from THE HEAD REBECCA PARKYN

The life of any school is invariably a series of transitions and as we look back on the academic year 22/23, I believe we will view this year as a seminal one in our history. The summer term saw the turning of a new chapter as we enlarged our estate to include another substantial building along St Simon's Road and our vision for a truly inclusive, high-achieving and forward looking school, where pastoral care and academia are intertwined with outstanding mental health support and specialist learning support intervention, drew a step closer. But what does Wyvern House stand for? What it isn't is a separate special needs school. Rather, it's a place of security and support for pupils who need social, emotional and mental health intervention and a place where pupils who need specialist learning support can be seen by one of our staff within a multidisciplinary team of experts. In the past few weeks, it has been such a joy to appoint more staff to this pioneering team and I look forward to working with them all as we seek to change life outcomes for the children we are privileged to have in our care. I have no doubt that schools of the future will need to carry with them their own multidisciplinary team rather than rely on making referrals to external agencies, as used to be the case. This is now an old model, as children were left waiting far too long for assistance which in turn resulted in children falling out of education or being subjected to very long stays in hospital with little prospect of finding their way back into some form of viable schooling when they were well enough. My aim is to ensure that we have the majority of the experts we need under one roof at Mayville and to offer pupils early intervention for their needs to prevent this type of scenario from reoccurring. In so doing, I hope we help to redefine and transform the way in which schools view pastoral support. Unsurprisingly, we have been deluged with requests for admission which just shows how desperately needed this type of provision is in Hampshire.

With so much happening at home, it has also been wonderful to see so many foreign residentials taking place this year. With trips to Sicily, Valencia, Munich as well as the return of our annual ski trip (this year to Aosta), we have managed to get our programme of visits back up and running post pandemic. We hosted the home leg of a cultural exchange with our partner school in Romania and, next term, we will hopefully take a group of pupils on the away leg to visit our friends in their own country. The partnership with Paradis International College in Lasi, Romania grew out of lockdown and as a result of the inception of our Online School, Mr Devoy taught their remote Physics lessons. It will be super to see this partnership flourishing into next academic year. With Mrs Jones about to depart with a group of pupils on a month-long expedition to Cambodia, we can certainly say that Mayville has had an international focus this year!

It was lovely that the whole community could get together on so many occasions this summer and very reassuring to see so many of you. Whether that was at one of our sports days, at the outstanding production of Wind in the Willows or at our Leavers' Service it was a chance to enjoy the spectacular events, often in the warm sunshine. News from our alumni community is always so well received by us all so thank you to the former pupils who send in news of their successes and who attend our events every summer. You will be able to read some of the news highlights later in this edition.

On behalf of the Trustees and all the staff, thank you to all our families for the trust in us you have shown this year. It has been such a pleasure to work with your wonderful children and in your service. As I look forward to the forthcoming academic year, I do so with renewed hope that we can make an even bigger difference to more families, not just to educational outcomes but to the future prospects of vulnerable children, as I send a new team into Wyvern House, as Mayville becomes pastorally supersonic!

Introducing our latest development... WYVERN HOUSE

Headteacher, Rebecca Parkyn, introduces our new Specialist Learning Support and Wellbeing Centre - Wyvern House - opening on 1st September 2023.

I have worked on this project for the last two years and to see it finally coming to fruition is really heartening. In many ways, it's Mayville's response to the astonishing demand for specialist educational and mental health support services we have been experiencing for some while and is, no doubt, one of the many legacies from the pandemic. In the past, we have had to decline admission to pupils who require an entirely bespoke curriculum as well as a separate house in which to work. This is now going to change as the School has recently acquired no 24 St Simon's Road; it is in an ideal location, being adjacent to our Junior School and central to all our school buildings. The purchase of Wyvern House was made possible thanks to a very generous donation by an anonymous benefactor, without which we could not have raised the funds needed for such an ambitious project.

For the last nearly 30 years, Mayville has had a very successful, CReSTeD registered, dyslexia unit. The quality of support afforded by this unit has been unparalleled in the local area and has been a draw to hundreds of families seeking this type of support for their child. Wyvern House will now build on this success and this is the next step in our journey to becoming the lead provider for neurodiverse children.

The Specialist Learning Support and Wellbeing Centre will be open to pupils with a variety of additional needs which prevent them from accessing mainstream education. Wyvern House will be home from home, a relaxed and nurturing environment. The house will be quiet and calm and it is unlikely that we will require a uniform to be worn for those who are educated there every day. A therapy dog will be on site, adding further to the homely feel.

In Wyvern House, in keeping with the wider ethos of Mayville High School itself, we have an 'everyone included' philosophy where we treat everyone as the individual they are and embrace diversity.

By growing a unit specialising in neurodiversity including Autistic Spectrum Conditions, alongside our already established CReSTeD registered Dyslexia Learning Unit, we are acutely aware of the adaptations pupils need to access education. At Wyvern, we can offer a place of escape from the regular school environment with specialist teachers on-hand to deliver the pupil's bespoke education package, as we seek to serve the most challenged young people in our society.

We have an expanding team of specialist teachers, speech and language therapists and will offer further services as we move forward.

Admission to Wyvern House will be by consultation with the SENCo, Headteacher and Registrar. We are happy to consult on placement through EHCPs, where Mayville is a named school on section I of the plan as agreed by the child's LEA. A thorough consideration of a pupil's needs will be undertaken before agreement is reached. For the ASD resource provision, a primary need must be social communication and interaction difficulties (in particular, Autistic Spectrum Conditions / neurodiverse profile) where SEMH is also prevalent. We will consider other comorbid conditions such as dyslexia, dyspraxia and ADHD/ADD and look at each pupil's profile, on a case by case basis.

We are pleased to announce that we have our own mental health counsellor, as part of our Wyvern team, and we will be able to cater for pupils who require social, emotional and specialist mental health support. Our future plans also include opening Wyvern at weekends for the benefit of the local community, so that families can access timely mental health support for their children, as required. We hope to work in association with CAMHS, in this regard.

Each pupil will access an education befitting their individual needs and wishes. We will take into account the thoughts and feelings of the pupil as well as their family. Wyvern House will be a place of respite and care, away from the hustle and bustle of normal school life, where pupils can regulate their emotions and receive a bespoke package of support.

Meet Roxy. Roxy is a therapy dog and Mayville High School's latest addition and a welcome part indeed. She was added to help those who need to de-stress. Students and Staff are very excited to welcome her to the school as the school has never had a therapy dog before. Mayville held a trial day and everyone enjoyed having a dog around the school. Roxy will have her own room at Wyvern House which is Mayville's Brand new Specialist Learning Support and Wellbeing Centre. However, Roxy will take frequent walks around school to get to know the pupils.

Mayville has a very supportive environment and therefore pupils would have no hesitation to visit Wyvern house to use Roxy's services if needed. Roxy is overqualified with her bronze, silver and gold standard training and cuteness. Her owner, Maz, explained that Roxy became a therapy dog in the hope that, "She could bring lots of joy to people as much as she brings joy to me." Maz, a Mayville staff member, says that Roxy loves being a therapy dog because, "Her tail always wags." – who wouldn't love attention and belly rubs?

Roxy is a part of Mayville High School's recently unveiled expansion that came in the form of

a Specialist Learning and Education building called Wyvern House. The unit is set to open at the start of the next school year for those aged 8-16 years old. Mayville prides itself on its unique and inclusive learning and this addition further cements this core ideal in the school. Struggling students can visit whenever they need help and the final goal is to improve mental health and especially for those on various neurodivergent spectrums (such as Autism and ADHD) who do not fit well into mainstream education due to social and communication difficulties.

Headteacher Rebecca Parkyn and the trustees have been working on the unit for two years and it shows.

The building will contain a mixture of facilities and staff dedicated to helping all students who enter its doors. Firstly, Wyvern House boasts a sensory room and garden for those who get overstimulated by the loud atmosphere of a busy school. Mayville will also hire a new team of staff, consisting of specialist teachers, speech therapists and language therapists who will work alongside existing staff. The building will also provide a base for the many support staff who already aid students who have specific needs. This is all thanks to an anonymous donor who gave the money required to purchase the building.



Welcoming new friends... A CULTURAL EXCHANGE



In May, we welcomed a group of 15 pupils and two teachers from Paradis International College, an independent school in Lasi, Romania.

As a creative arts school with a strong focus on traditional Romanian dance, music, costume and culture, Mayville provided the perfect base for their students to sample a change of environment and learn about our culture and history.

They were in the UK for a week, spending three days in school with us and two days exploring the sites and attractions of Portsmouth and London. Each exchange student was paired with a Year 9 (U4) 'pupil-pal', who introduced them to life at Mayville and helped them navigate their way through timetabled lessons and a wealth of extracurricular activities.

On the Friday, the wonderful green uniforms were replaced with red, white and blue, as our visitors joined in the Coronation celebrations.

Mr Worrall, who organised the week, praised the exchange as a huge success, with both sets of pupils gaining valuable experiences and making new friends. The visiting teachers, Loredana and Alin, commented on how welcome they had been made to feel by everyone at Mayville.

Discussions to develop this cultural exchange program are already underway, with plans being made to take a group of Mayville pupils on a return visit to Romania next year – watch this space!

OUR NEW SCHOOL VIDEO








During the second half of the Summer Term, we have been working with our friends at Millstream Productions, on shooting a new promotional video for the School.


