NEWS IN BRIEF

Senior pupils took to the stage at New Theatre Royal for this year's production, *School of Rock*. Audiences were treated to two exhilarating performances of the smash hit musical. The finale had the crowd dancing in the aisles, in this incredible feel-good end to the year (pages 6-9).

The weather held for our annual **Summer** Fair and we had a full programme of musical performances in the marquee. From wartime songs to *Cranberries* covers, there was something for everyone. Activities and stalls on the day raised over £600 for the Mayville PTA (pages 10-11).


The summer term took on a different tone with the somewhat sudden calling of a general election. Thank you to the many who wrote personally to me and who gave up their time to attend parent consultations. We are also very grateful to the extraordinary efforts of Mrs Wisniak from the PTA who spearheaded awareness of the implications of potential taxation changes so thoughtfully and successfully. And of course on the last day of term, we entered a new era further to the election of a new government. As you may recall, it is the stated policy of the Government to impose VAT on school fees and to end business rates relief for schools with charitable status. This has been the predominant political issue for the independent sector for a good while and has taken up a good deal of my time recently. Mayville needs to continue to make a positive case for our School and the independent sector more widely. We will continue to point out that we believe the Government's VAT policy is misguided with potentially damaging consequences for the sector. We will need to make efficiencies wherever we can to reduce the financial impact on our parent community. In the coming months, we will need to embrace the challenge which change brings. That challenge often helps to drive personal and collective achievement with the process being valued as much as the outcome. So, while the direction is set, the route will develop. As we plan for the future, we can't be complacent. It's important to be thoughtful and discerning in how we respond and in so doing we will continue to balance the old with the new.

So, what's next? As we begin to look forward to September we will see our alternative provision, Wyvern House, entering stage two of its development with an increased number of pupils being admitted. It has been a constant joy to see how our multi-disciplinary team has been caring for our most vulnerable pupils. We will be offering an increased number of foreign residentials to broaden our pupils' horizons and on the academic front we will be enhancing stretch and challenge across the curriculum and increasing our provision for our more able, gifted and talented pupils.

Mayville moves forward with ambition and confidence into the autumn! Wishing everyone a very restful summer break and I look forward to welcoming your children back to school on 4th September.

Although we didn't place in the finals, the judges' comments will be a memory that the whole team can treasure, "Next stop: The West End."














Our summer production... SCHOOLOF ROCK



Audiences were treated to two spectacular performances of the smash hit musical *School of Rock* at New Theatre Royal in Portsmouth.



We hope that pupils have brought these skills home with them!






PORTSMOUTH BIG CITY READ


JUNIOR SCHOOL SPORTS DAY



They also enjoyed a taster day at HSDC in late June, experiencing academic and vocational qualifications first hand.

Another vital area of PSHE is financial literacy. According to the findings from the Money and Pensions Service June 2023 report that 'a meaningful financial education is strongly linked to good financial attitudes and behaviours such as active saving, confidence managing their money and having more positive attitudes towards money' which will in turn lead to better financial wellbeing as adults. At Mayville, we have been pleased with the success of the lessons delivered across the Senior School, with pupils investigating financial decision making and financial risks. Behind the scenes, the department has been working hard on reshaping the curriculum, so that pupils in all year groups will receive financial literacy education next academic year.

Much of our job as PSHE educators is being able to respond to current affairs. With the announcement of an earlier-than-expected General Election, the department quickly resourced lessons to inform pupils of the fundamentals of democracy, elections, voting and their local candidates. Engaging young people with politics is vital; political apathy is an issue that we all need to tackle, to ensure that once our pupils reach voting age, they are engaged with the political landscape.

Another area that is firmly on our radar is the rapid advancement of AI in and out of education. Whilst there are clearly many benefits to using AI, there are also risks that pupils need to be aware of. As we look ahead to the next academic year, the department has been busy researching and producing lessons that cover a range of topics, from the impact of generative AI on children's mental health to the benefits and disadvantages of using ChatGPT in the classroom. Whether we like it or not, AI is here to stay and it is our duty to help the pupils make well-informed decisions about its use.

As many of you will be aware, the Department for Education announced its review of relationships, sex and health education (RSHE) back in May. Whilst reviews of the guidance are always welcome, as practitioners we hope that the government will continue to ensure the safety of all pupils and that the proposed age restrictions on certain topics will not be detrimental to their wellbeing. As soon as the new guidance is published, we will be making any necessary changes to the PSHE curriculum.

Finally, as we look ahead to the new academic year, we would like to share with you the new topics that the pupils will be studying in the Autumn Term.


